Dear Friends,

Ted Loder was a Methodist minister in Germantown section of Philadelphia who has a wonderful way with words. He has a prayer for Summer that gives thanks for this season “of sun and slow motion, of games and porch sitting, of picnics and light green fireflies on heavy purple evenings.” He asks that this season might be “a time of gathering together the pieces into which my busyness has broken me.” “Most of all,” he says, “let me live easily and grace-fully for a spell, so that I may see other souls deeply, share in a silence unhurried, listen to the sound of sunlight and shadows, explore barefoot the land of forgotten dreams and shy hopes, and find the right words to tell another who I am.”<sup>1</sup>



## A Cry for Deliverance (Psalm 59)

Psalm 59:16-17 *"But I will sing of your strength, in the morning I will sing of your love; for you are my fortress, my refuge in times of trouble. You are my strength, I sing praise to you. You, O God, are my fortress, my God on whom I can rely."* NIV

Let's remember that the Psalter was the songbook of the worshiping people of God. Psalm 59 has some discordant language that may seem hard to imagine anyone singing. Two things about this psalm that require some consideration for better understanding are noted in the heading. The first point is in regards to the name of the tune; and the second is the historical relationship between David and Saul.

The heading for this psalm references a tune called **"Do Not Destroy"**. It is not known whether it was originally a tune or merely a chant pattern, but it must have been popular because there are three additional psalms whose headings also reference this, (Psalms 57, 58 and 75). So even in ancient Israel, people wrote different words for the same tune. The title of the tune **"Do Not Destroy"** was perhaps influenced by the phrase in Deuteronomy 9:26 or 1 Samuel 26:9.

Psalm 59 is not a complex piece of scripture but to fully understand and appreciate this psalm it's important to understand its place in history. The heading for Psalm 59 states that it is **"A Miktam of David, when Saul sent men to watch his house in order to kill him."** This refers to an incident described in 1 Samuel 19:11. Therefore, for a better understanding of this psalm, one needs to be familiar with the stories regarding the relationship between Saul and David found in chapters 17-22 of 1 Samuel. (*Incidentally, Miktam is a word of unknown meaning found in the headings to Psalms 16 and 56-60.*)

In this psalm, David describes the people who are plotting against him in very harsh terms; calling them criminals, murderers and vicious dogs. This may seem harsh on first reading of the psalm, but once you understand the depths of despair that David must have experienced, it should be easier to appreciate the language. David felt betrayed because Saul, the King of Israel – an individual whom David respected, whose daughter he married, and whose son, Jonathan, was his best friend; was scheming to kill him.

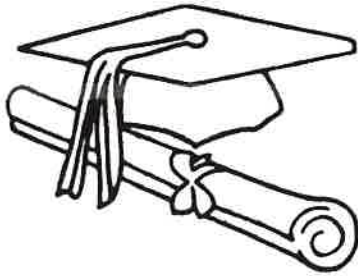
The faithful who sang this hymn in ancient Israel identified with David's confidence in God's saving grace in the presence of imminent danger. The despair, fear and angst that David felt are expressed in the poetry of this psalm.

Psalm 59 is a cry for deliverance. However, it ends with the psalmist singing praises to God verses 16 and 17. The juxtaposition of the feeling of helplessness and despair with that of comfort and refuge reminds me of Psalm 23:4; **"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death; I will fear no evil, for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."**
